Chapter 1. Overview

1.1 INTRODUCTION

This chapter describes the RN131/171 Evaluation Kits that are used for demonstrating the RN131 and RN171 module capabilities. These boards have the flexibility to connect directly to computers/laptops through a standard USB interface or to embedded controllers through the serial UART interface. These evaluation boards contain two push buttons, namely RESET and FN. The RESET button is used to reset the module and the FN button is used to launch different applications depending on software configuration. The status LEDs enables quick debug support.

The RN171 Evaluation Board has an additional flexibility of powering up through battery pack (two AAA batteries) apart from connecting through USB cable to the host PC. Analog sensor interface supported by RN131 and RN171 Evaluation Boards also provides direct connections to read analog signals such as temperature, acceleration and so on.

1.2 RN131/171 EVALUATION KIT FEATURES

1.2.1 RN131 Evaluation Board Features

- · Configuration over Wi-Fi or UART using simple ASCII commands
- Supports 921 Kbps TX, 500 Kbps RX data rates with TCP/IP and WPA2 over UART
- Powered by a USB cable (5V)
- · Push buttons for launching Applications and RESET signals


FIGURE 1-1: **EVALUATION KIT CONTENTS** RN-131-EK · RN131 Evaluation Board USB cable RN-171-EK • RN171 Evaluation Board • USB cable



Chapter 2. Getting Started

2.1 INTRODUCTION

This chapter describes the RN131/171 Evaluation Kit board as an independent development board for exploring the ASCII command set and prototyping of embedded systems. Certain hardware and software/utilities are essential to support the development of demo applications.

This chapter discusses the following topics:

- Hardware Requirements
- · Software/Utility Requirements
- Module Configuration

2.2 HARDWARE REQUIREMENTS

Along with an USB cable either RN-131-EK or RN-171-EK boards are required for evaluation hardware setup and to run the demo applications.

2.2.1 Hardware Setup

The following are the steps to setup the RN131/171 Evaluation Board demo:

- Supply power to RN-131-EK and RN-171-EK evaluation board using an USB cable. Alternatively, power can be supplied to RN-171-EK evaluation board by inserting two AAA batteries into the battery pack.
- 2. Connect the USB cable to a USB port on the host system and to the USB connector on the evaluation board.
- 3. If the drivers are not automatically installed, download and install the FTDI drivers from the Microchip web site "http://ww1.microchip.com/downloads/en/Device-Doc/FTDI-Drivers.zip" FTDI Chipset Drivers.
- 4. Once the FTDI drivers are installed, the COM port is automatically assigned based on the active connection.

Figure 2-1 and Figure 2-2 show the setup arrangement of RN131 and RN171 Evaluation Boards connected to computer/laptop.

2.3 **SOFTWARE/UTILITY REQUIREMENTS**

The following software tools/utilities are required to run the demo applications:

· Terminal Emulator Application such as TeraTerm (for Windows OS) or CoolTerm (for MAC OS)

Note: Terminal Emulator program is used to send the configuration commands to the module over a UART interface. The emulator also displays information transmitted from the module.

Both RN131 and RN171 Evaluation Boards use the FTDI chip set. Windows automatically installs the drivers for the USB-serial cable. If the drivers are not automatically installed, download and install the FTDI drivers from the Microchip web site "http://ww1.microchip.com/downloads/en/DeviceDoc/FTDI-Drivers.zip" FTDI Chipset Drivers.

 Once the FTDI drivers are installed, the COM port is automatically assigned based on the active connection.

2.4 MODULE CONFIGURATION


The RN131/171 module operates in two modes:

- Data mode (default)
- · Command mode

2.4.1 Data Mode

In Data mode, the RN131/171 module is essentially a data pipe. When the module receives data over Wi-Fi, it strips the TCP/IP headers and trailers, and passes the user data to the UART. When data is written to the UART, the module constructs the TCP/IP packet and sends it out over Wi-Fi. Thus, the entire process of sending/receiving data to the host is transparent to the end application/user microcontroller.

2.4.2 Command Mode

By default, the RN131/171 module is in Data mode. Sending an escape sequence \$\$\$ causes the module to enter the Command mode. Once in Command mode, module can be configured using simple ASCII commands. To exit Command mode and return to the Data mode, type exit <cr>
 Figure 2-3 shows an application interface for Data and Command modes.

Basic configuration requires the wireless network access point's name (SSID) and the authentication password. The RN131/171 module can associate with only one network at a time. It is recommended to begin evaluation by configuring the RN131/171 module using an open access point to simplify the setup.

The following two methods are used to configure the RN131/171 module:

- 1. Over the UART, that is connected to a computer/laptop or to a microcontroller
- Through Wi-Fi using Ad hoc networking

Terminal emulator is required to type the commands and to monitor the transactions.

2.4.3 Configuration Using a USB Cable

The evaluation board uses a USB cable to allow the host computer to communicate with the RN131/171 module on the evaluation board.

The following instructions describe how to use a terminal emulator to go into Configuration mode, send commands to find networks, associate with an access point and save configuration.

2.4.3.1 CONFIGURE THE MODULE USING A TERMINAL EMULATOR

Either the TeraTerm (for Windows OS) or CoolTerm (for Mac OS-X), terminal emulator program can be used. Also legacy evaluation boards uses a USB-to-serial cable for connecting the evaluation board with the computer/laptop. When using either of the RN131/171 evaluation board, use the COM port to which the USB-to-serial cable is connected.

The following are the steps to communicate with the module using a terminal emulator:




FIGURE 2-4: FINDING THE COM PORT NUMBER IN WINDOWS

- 1. Determine the COM port that is assigned to the USB cable (the port is COM9 in the example shown in Figure 2-4).
- 2. Open the available terminal emulation program and specify the COM port.
- 3. When using TeraTerm, go to Serial option and select the COM port number from the drop-down menu.
- 4. The serial port with the required settings are as follows:

Baud: 9600Data bits: 8Parity: NoneStop bits: 1

- Flow control: None

5. Type the commands through the terminal emulator program and to the assigned program.

Note: COM port number can be found as follows:

- For Windows OS: Go to the Windows Device Manager, from System Tools. In the Device Manager, browse and expand the selection for serial ports (COM & LPT). Use TeraTerm for other configuration settings and monitoring.
- For MAC OS: When using CoolTerm, view and select the port from the same terminal emulator application.


2.4.3.2 ENTER COMMAND MODE

The following are the steps to enter the Command mode in a terminal emulator:

- 1. Type \$\$\$ on the keyboard sequentially with no additional characters before or after each \$ sign. The module replies with CMD (on terminal emulator) to indicate it is in Command mode.
- 2. Type show net <cr> to display the current network settings (Figure 2-5 shows the current network settings for the version 2.28).

Note: When a command is completed, the terminal displays a prompt in the format <X.XX>, where X.XX indicates the module's firmware version.

Commands to the module is first sent with a keyword followed by an optional parameter. Spaces are not allowed to use as parameters. The commands are case sensitive. Use a \$ to indicate a space (For example, MY NETWORK must be written as MY\$NETWORK). Additionally, short form for the parameters can be used. For example, the following commands are equivalent:

```
set uart baudrate 115200
set uart b 115200
set u b 15200
```

Note: Short forms are not used for command keywords. For example, s uart baudrate 115200 is illegal.

The RN131/171 module supports a variety of command keywords. The WiFly Command Reference, Advanced Features and Applications User's Guide Reference from the Microchip web site http://www.microchip.com provides a complete command of references.

For evaluation purposes, view the current settings using the get command; get everything to shows all parameters. Table 2-1 shows an additional parameters that can be used with set and get commands.



2.4.3.3 FIND AVAILABLE NETWORKS

In Command mode, instruct the RN131/171 module to search for the available networks. By typing scan <cr>
 in the terminal emulator a list of Wi-Fi networks within the radio range can be viewed. Figure 2-6 shows the scanned network/access points.

2.4.3.4 ASSOCIATE WITH AN ACCESS POINT

Use the join keyword to associate with an open access point. Figure 2-6 shows roving1 as an open access point in the scan list.

To associate with an access point, type the following commands:

```
join roving1
or
join # 1
```

To disconnect from a network, type <code>leave <cr>.</code> The Red LED blinks quickly when the RN131/171 module is not associated with an access point.

To associate a module automatically with a network upon booting (i.e., persistent configuration), use the set wlan command with the SSID. For example, type the following commands:


```
set wlan ssid roving1
save
reboot
```

When the module wakes or power cycles, the module attempts to associate with the network roving1. To associate with a secure network, the module requires the network password. The WiFly RN131/171 module determines the security type automatically. In this case, type the following commands:

```
set wlan ssid roving1
set wlan pass rubygirl
set wlan join 1 //enables auto join
save
reboot
```

Figure 2-7 shows the secured network connection. To confirm this established connection and security settings type get wlan <cr>.

2.4.4 Configuration Using AP Mode

AP mode released as part of the standard firmware replaces Ad hoc mode.

AP mode provides several advantages over Ad hoc mode.

In AP mode:

- The module creates a soft AP network to which Android devices (smartphones and tablets) can join. (Android devices do not support ad hoc networking.)
- The module runs a DHCP server and issues IP addresses to seven clients, which is much faster than automatic IP in Ad hoc mode.
- The RN131/171 module supports security, unlike Ad hoc, which is an open mode.
- · The module supports routing between clients.

Load the appropriate firmware, version 2.45 or later, to enable the AP mode. Modify the boot image to version 2.45 to use AP mode. Change the module's firmware image using the **boot image** <*value*> command. After changing the boot image, reset the module back to the factory defaults using the Factory reset and **reboot** commands.

The following firmware images are available from the Microchip website:

- Wifly_EZX-236.img—Ad hoc mode firmware for RN171
- Wifly_GSX-236.img—Ad hoc mode firmware for RN131
- Wifly_EZX-245.img—Soft AP mode for RN171
- Wifly_GSX-245.img—Soft AP mode for RN131

Note: RN131/171 module firmware can be upgraded to the latest version through FTP update. For additional information on FTP update and commands, refer to "WiFly Command Reference, Advanced Features and Applications User's Guide" from the Microchip web site at http://www.microchip.com.

In firmware version 2.36 (ad hoc mode), the auto join feature is enabled to maintain backwards compatibility. In version 2.45 (AP mode), auto join is disabled and must be explicitly enabled using the **set wlan join 1** command.

The following sections describe how to use the AP mode with RN Wi-Fi modules, including configuring the module to act as an AP, enabling AP mode in hardware and software, and ending data to the module from a remote host.

2.4.5 Enabling AP mode

There are two methods for enabling AP mode, hardware and software, as described in the following sections.

2.4.5.1 ENABLE IN HARDWARE

To enable AP mode in hardware, hold GPIO9 high at 3.3V and then reboot (or power cycle) the module. The module boots up in AP mode with the DHCP server enabled.

Note: For more details on programming/configuring the module, refer to the documentation of module used on the Support page from the Microchip web site at http://www.microchip.com.

Table 2-2 shows the default AP mode settings.

When the module boots, other Wi-Fi-enabled devices (PCs, iPhones, iPads, Android tablets, etc.) must be able to see the module when they scan for access points.

Note: It is recommended to set the RN131/171 module as a gateway when creating point-to-point network between devices (Wi-Fi network only).

If devices such as smartphones and tablets (iPads, Android tablets, etc.) with a WAN connection associate to the soft AP network, Roving Networks recommends setting the gateway to 0. This setting enables these smartphones route the data from Wi-Fi to the 3G or 4G WAN network.

2.4.5.2 ENABLE IN SOFTWARE

After rebooting, the module is in AP mode.

Enable AP mode in software using the **set wlan join 7** command. Customize network settings such as the SSID, channel and IP address in software to create a custom AP mode. For example, the following commands create a custom AP mode in software:

2.4.6 Using AP Mode

The following sections describe how to use AP mode, including connecting to the module, checking for the last device connected over TCP, viewing associated devices, enabling the link monitor and routing data between clients.

2.4.6.1 CONNECT TO THE MODULE

Once the module boots up in AP mode, any client device can associate with the network the module is broadcasting. Once associated, the module's DHCP server assigns an IP address to the client device.

The default lease time is 1 day i.e., 86,400 seconds. Based on the requirement, configure or change the lease time using the **set dhcp lease** <*value*> command, where <*value*> is the time in seconds. To view a list of devices associated with the module, use the **show lease** command. The command output is in the following format with commas delimiting the fields:

Note: In AP mode, the module can assign a DHCP lease to 7 clients. However, not all clients report the host name. In this case, the module reports the name as an asterisk (*).

Once a client is associated to the network, it can open a TCP connection to the RN131/171 module. After successfully opening a TCP connection, the client receives a ***HELLO*** message. The RN131/171 module prints ***OPEN*** on the UART, indicating an open TCP connection.



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Chapter 3. Application Design Concerns

3.1 INTRODUCTION

This section provides the design concerns related to powering the evaluation board, sensor interface settings, Ad hoc mode and restoring factory settings.

3.1.1 Powering the Module

The RN131/RN171 Evaluation Board is powered using the USB cable or through the battery pack, which holds two AAA batteries. However, RN131 Evaluation Board can also be powered using air-wiring.

Note: The RN171 module can also be powered through the USB cable while a battery pack is installed.

3.1.2 Sensor Interfaces

The input voltage on the sensor inputs must not exceed 1.2V. The Analog-to-Digital Converter (ADC) saturates at 400 mV. It is recommended to use the sensor power output to drive any analog devices that are attached to the sensor pins.

Note: Sensor pins 2 and 3 have a resistor network in front of sensors 4 and 5, respectively. Hence, these pins can be driven with up to 3.3V DC.

3.1.3 GPIO9 Functions

The AP push button is connected to GPIO9. Depending on the state of GPIO9, the module enters into three different modes: AP mode, Factory reset and WPS mode.

3.1.3.1 AP MODE

To put the module into AP mode, GPIO9 must be high when the module powers up or wakes from a sleep state. Press the AP mode button to drive GPIO9 high, and then press the RESET button to reset the module. The module is in default AP mode, which creates a default access point network with the default parameters as listed in Table 3-1.

Note: This default mode overwrites any software settings.

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Once the module boots, other Wi-Fi-enabled devices (such as, computers, iPhones, iPads, android tablets, etc.) are able to find the module when access points are scanned.

3.1.3.2 FACTORY RESET

In the Factory Reset mode, the module is restored to the factory defaults.

Perform the following steps to restore the defaults:

- 1. Put the module into default AP mode as described in AP Mode.
- 2. Press the **AP Mode** push button 5 times (with 1 or more seconds between presses).

This feature is useful in case the module is misconfigured and is no longer responding.

3.1.4 Reset

The RESET push button reboots the module.





FIGURE A-3: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD TOP SILKSCREEN




FIGURE A-4: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD BOTTOM SILKSCREEN




FIGURE A-5: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD TOP COPPER




FIGURE A-6: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD BOTTOM COPPER




FIGURE A-7: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD TOP ASSEMBLY






FIGURE A-8: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD BOTTOM ASSEMBLY








FIGURE A-11: RN171 EVALUATION BOARD TOP COPPER




FIGURE A-12: RN171 EVALUATION BOARD BOTTOM COPPER




FIGURE A-13: RN171 EVALUATION BOARD TOP ASSEMBLY





FIGURE A-14: RN171 EVALUATION BOARD BOTTOM ASSEMBLY

FIGURE A-15: RN131 EVALUATION BOARD PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS





FIGURE A-16: RN171 EVALUATION BOARD PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS
