









Description

The UJ4C075044K3S is a 750V, $44m\Omega$ G4 SiC FET. It is based on a unique 'cascode' circuit configuration, in which a normally-on SiC JFET is co-packaged with a Si MOSFET to produce a normally-off SiC FET device. The device's standard gate-drive characteristics allows for a true "drop-in replacement" to Si IGBTs, Si FETs, SiC MOSFETs or Si superjunction devices. Available in the TO-247-3L package, this device exhibits ultra-low gate charge and exceptional reverse recovery characteristics, making it ideal for switching inductive loads and any application requiring standard gate drive.

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










Figure 2. Typical output characteristics at $T_J = 25$ °C, tp < 250 μ s






Figure 3. Typical output characteristics at T_J = 175°C, $tp < 250 \mu s$

Figure 4. Normalized on-resistance vs. temperature at V_{GS} = 12V














Figure 6. Typical transfer characteristics at V_{DS} = 5V






Figure 7. Threshold voltage vs. junction temperature at V_{DS} = 5V and I_{D} = 10mA

Figure 8. Typical gate charge at $I_D = 25A$
















Figure 9. 3rd quadrant characteristics at $T_J = -55$ °C




Figure 10. 3rd quadrant characteristics at T_J = 25°C




Figure 11. 3rd quadrant characteristics at $T_J = 175$ °C




Figure 12. Typical stored energy in C_{OSS} at $V_{GS} = 0V$

















Figure 17. Safe operation area at T_C = 25°C, D = 0, Parameter t_p




Figure 19. Clamped inductive switching energy vs. drain current at V_{DS} = 400V and T_J = 25°C




Figure 18. Reverse recovery charge Qrr vs. junction temperature




Figure 20. Clamped inductive switching energy vs. drain current at $V_{DS} = 500V$ and $T_J = 25^{\circ}C$














Figure 22. RC snubber energy losses vs. drain current at V_{DS} = 500V and T_J = 25°C






Figure 23. Clamped inductive switching energies vs. $R_{G,EXT}$ at V_{DS} = 400V, I_D = 25A, and T_J = 25°C

Figure 24. RC snubber energy losses vs. $R_{G,EXT}$ at V_{DS} = 400V, I_D = 25A, and T_I = 25°C














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


Figure 29. Clamped inductive switching energy vs. drain current at $V_{DS} = 400V$ and $T_J = 25^{\circ}C$




Figure 30. Clamped inductive switching energy vs. drain current at V_{DS} = 500V and T_J = 25°C




Figure 31. RC snubber energy losses vs. drain current at V_{DS} = 400V and T_J = 25°C




Figure 32. RC snubber energy losses vs. drain current at V_{DS} = 500V and T_J = 25°C














Figure 34. Clamped inductive switching energy vs. junction temperature at V_{DS} = 500V and I_{D} = 25A






Figure 35. Schematic of the half-bridge mode switching test circuit. Note, a bus RC snubber (R_{BS} = 5Ω , C_{BS} =100nF) is used to reduce the power loop high frequency oscillations.

Applications Information

SiC FETs are enhancement-mode power switches formed by a high-voltage SiC depletion-mode JFET and a low-voltage silicon MOSFET connected in series. The silicon MOSFET serves as the control unit while the SiC JFET provides high voltage blocking in the off state. This combination of devices in a single package provides compatibility with standard gate drivers and offers superior performance in terms of low on-resistance ($R_{DS(on)}$), output capacitance (C_{oss}), gate charge (Q_G), and reverse recovery charge (Q_{rr}) leading to low conduction and switching losses. The SiC FETs also provide excellent reverse conduction capability eliminating the need for an external anti-parallel diode.

Like other high performance power switches, proper PCB layout design to minimize circuit parasitics is strongly recommended due to the high dv/dt and di/dt rates. An external gate resistor is recommended when the FET is working in the diode mode in order to achieve the optimum reverse recovery performance. A snubber circuit with a small $R_{(G)}$, or gate resistor, provides better EMI suppression with higher efficiency compared to using a high $R_{(G)}$ value. There is no extra gate delay time when using the snubber circuitry, and a small $R_{(G)}$ will better control both the turn-off $V_{(DS)}$ peak spike and ringing duration, while a high $R_{(G)}$ will damp the peak spike but result in a longer delay time. In addition, the total switching loss when using a snubber circuit is less than using high $R_{(G)}$, while greatly reducing $E_{(OFF)}$ from mid-to-full load range with only a small increase in $E_{(ON)}$.
