

## 1.0 GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This series of graphical 140 x 16 dot matrix Vacuum Fluorescent Display (VFD) modules is capable of displaying both graphics and text using built-in font tables. The modules contain VFD driver circuitry, one microcontroller, one DC-DC/AC converter and various host interfaces.

A five-pin connector supports the serial interface connections and a fourteen-pin connector supports the parallel interface. Both connections also require a 5VDC power supply to operate the module. See sections *System Block Diagram* and *Parallel Interface Connector* and *Serial Interface Connector* for more detail.

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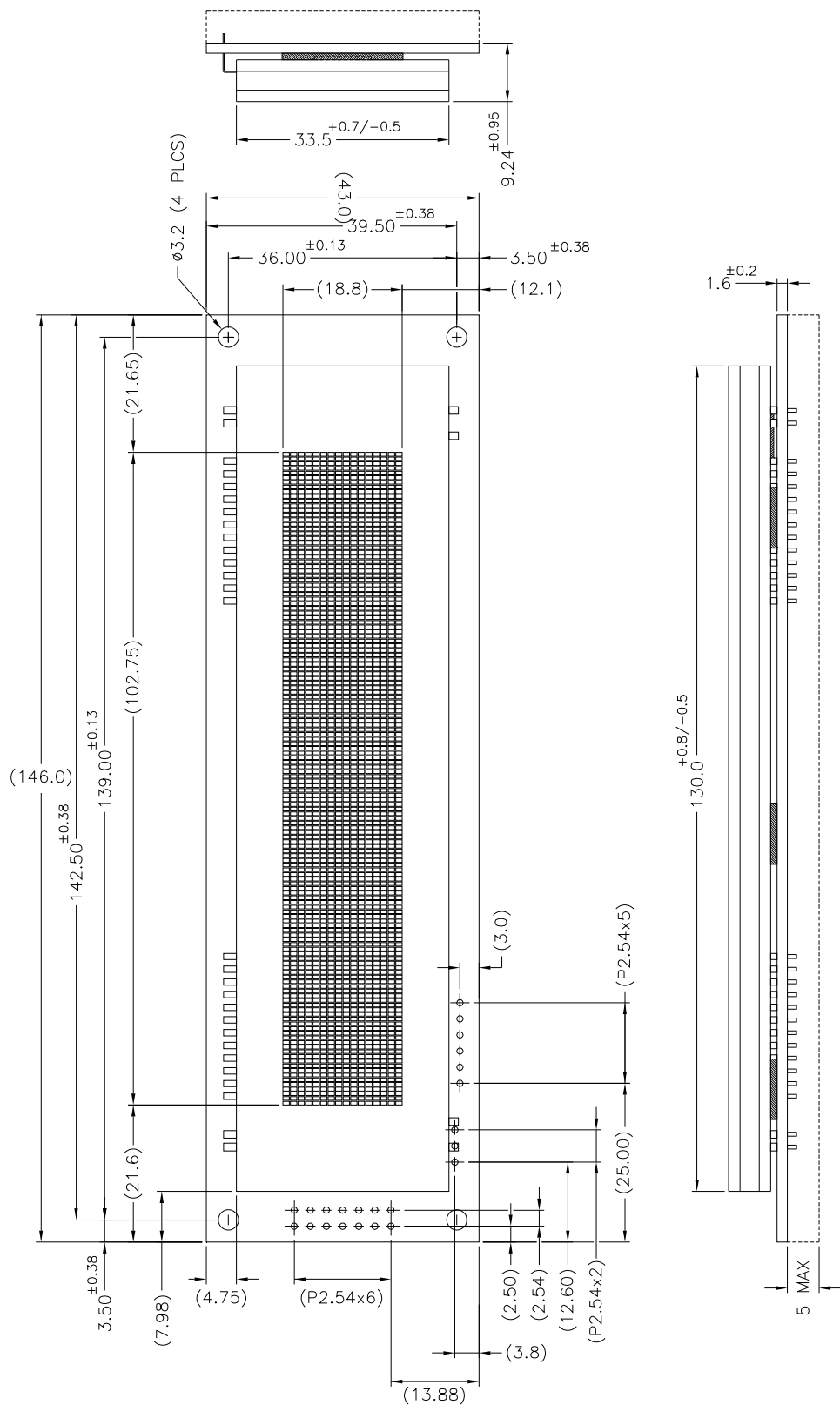

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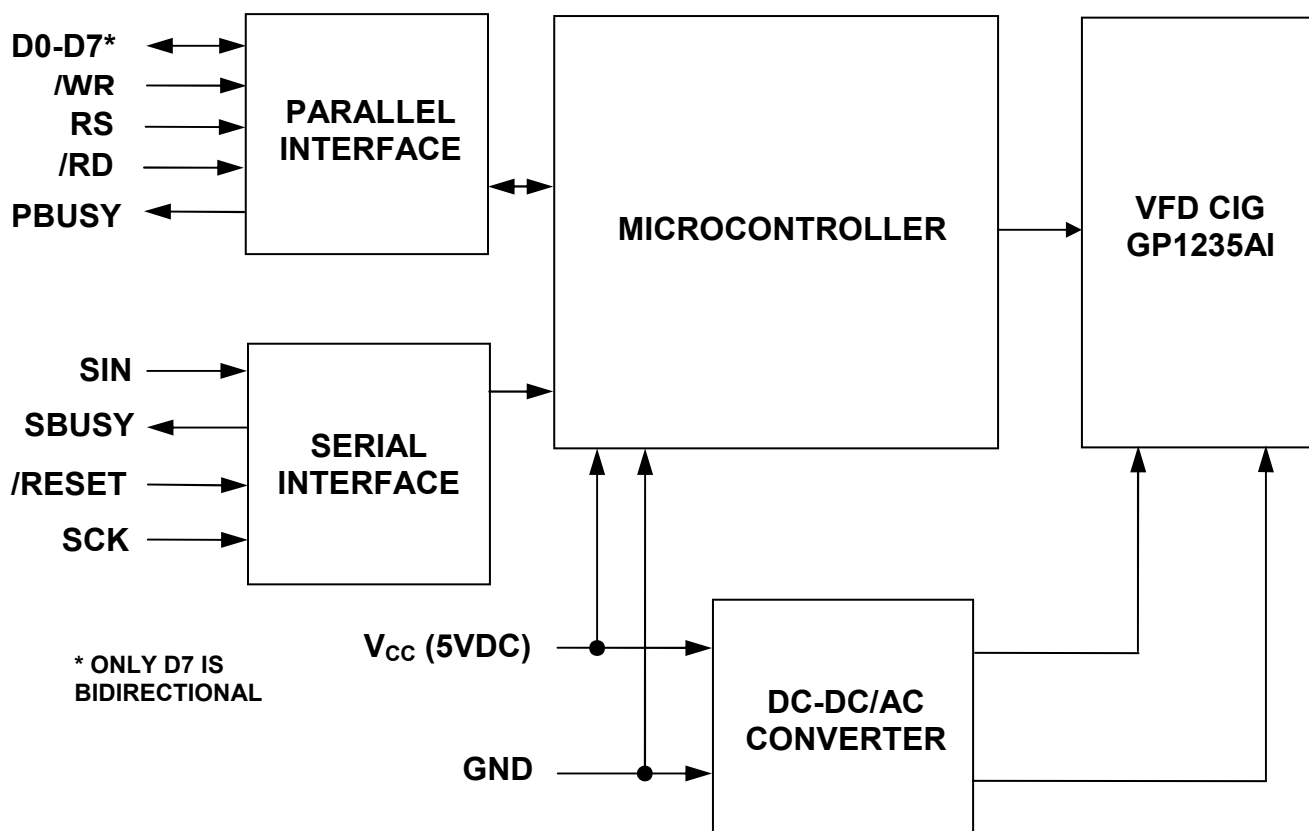
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### 3.2 SYSTEM BLOCK DIAGRAM

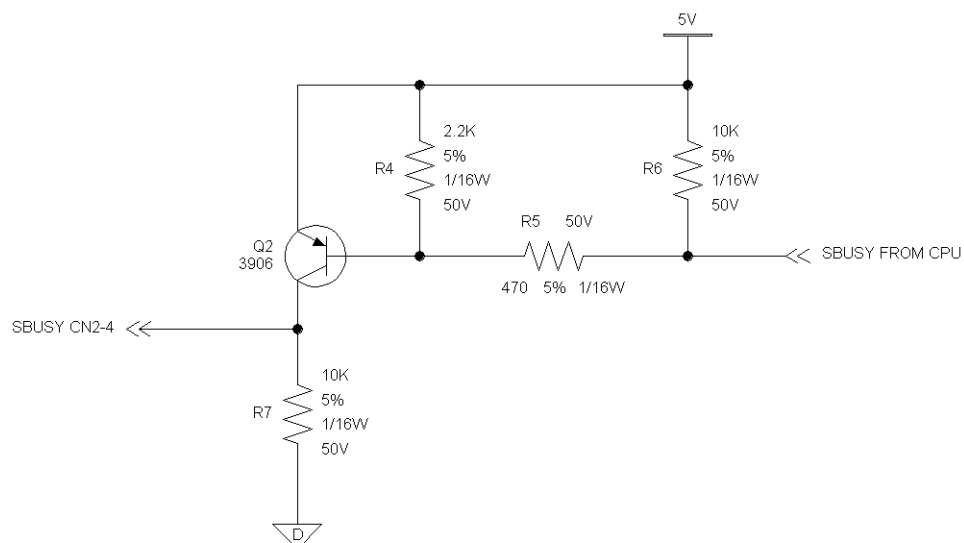

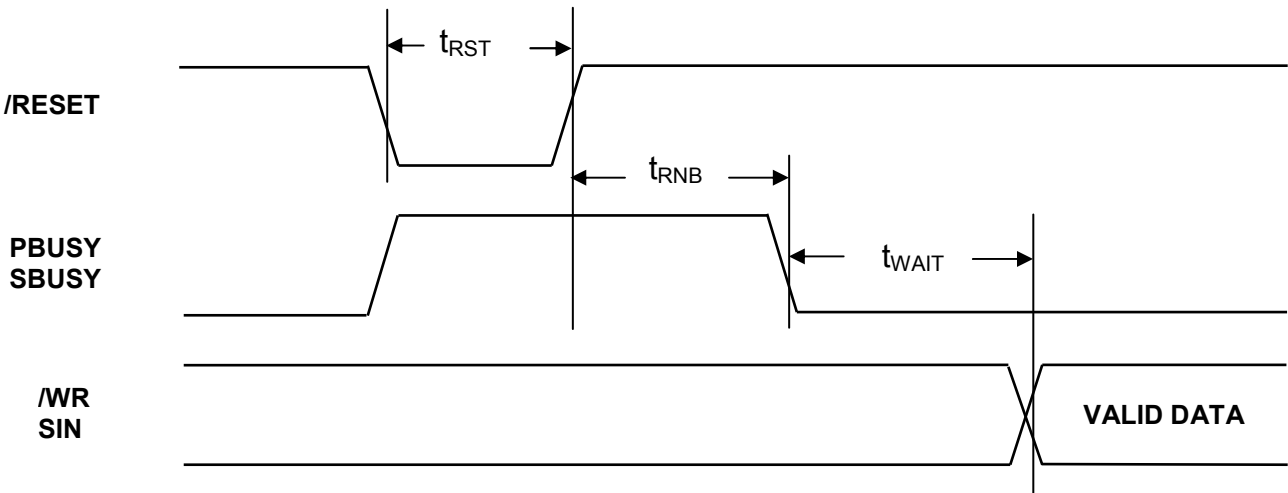


Figure 1: Reset Timing

The module sets PBUSY and SBUSY when /RESET is asserted. When ready to receive data, the module will clear PBUSY and SBUSY.

The module resets automatically upon power-up and may be reset at any time by pulling /RESET low. Further, if  $V_{CC}$  drops below 4.0V (4.0V typical, 3.68V min), the module resets.

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### 3.6.2 PARALLEL INTERFACE OPERATION

The parallel interface accepts display data and commands in 8-bit bytes. Upon receipt of a byte, the module sets PBUSY and then holds PBUSY high until it can process the byte. PBUSY can be read either by reading data bit D7 or directly reading the PBUSY bit. RS is reserved for switching between data and command bytes but, it is not implemented in this series of modules.

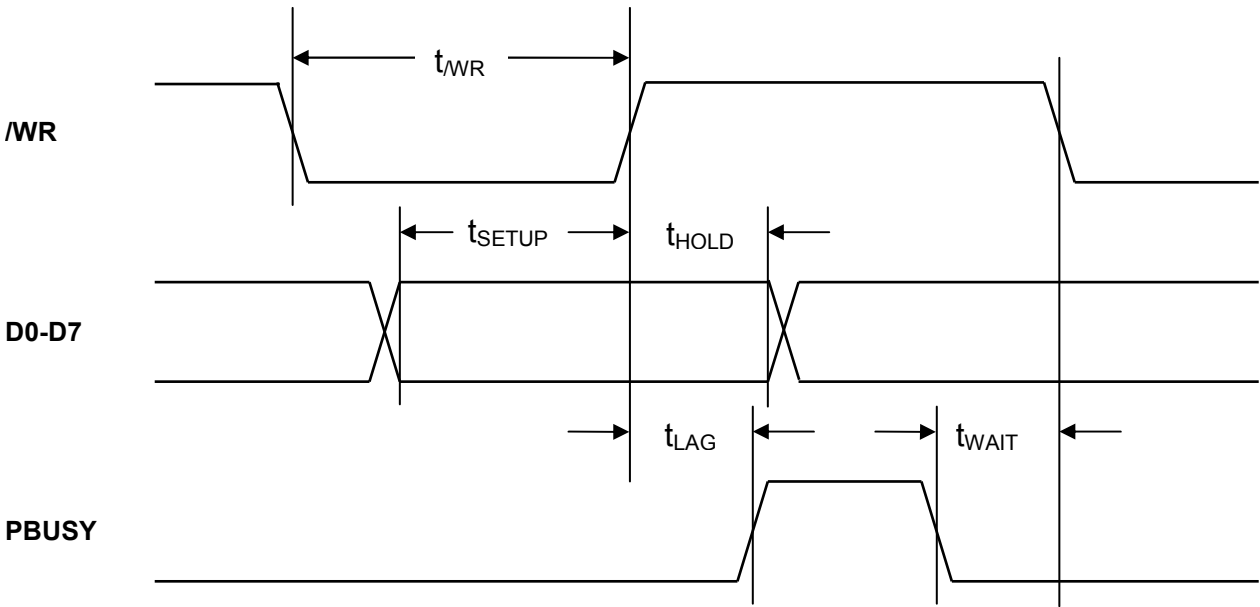


Figure 2: Parallel Interface Write Timing

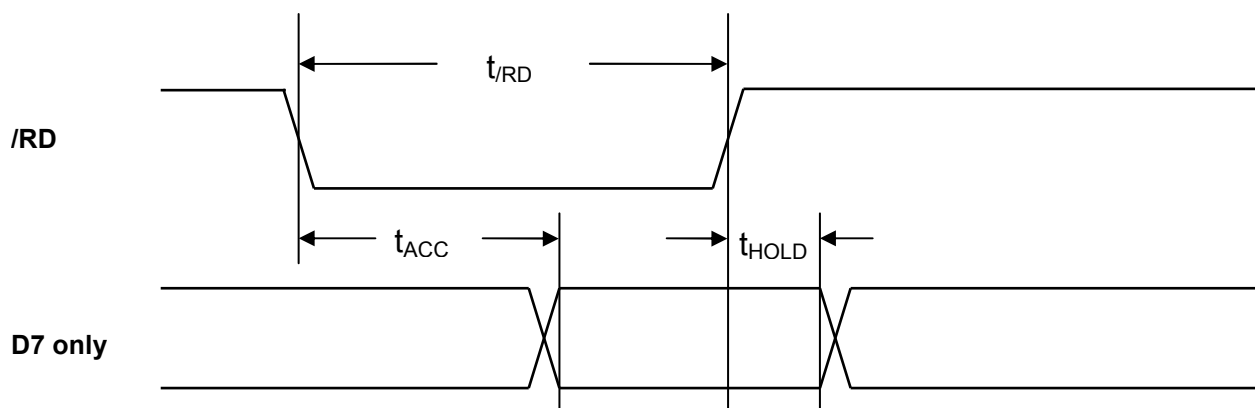


Figure 3: Parallel Interface Read Timing

### 3.6.3 SERIAL INTERFACE OPERATION

The NAGP1235A series of VFD modules provides up to three serial interfaces depending on the exact model of the display: RS-232 level asynchronous, CMOS level asynchronous and CMOS level synchronous. Each of these modes is jumper selectable. Each mode uses the SBUSY line to control data flow.

When an 8-bit byte is sent to a module, SBUSY is asserted. One more byte may be sent after SBUSY is asserted. Although this is possible, it is not recommended. Then, the host must wait until the module clears SBUSY before sending any more data.

The table below shows the data format and rates for the RS-232 level and CMOS level of asynchronous communication. It is not possible to read SBUSY from the display using a serial interface.

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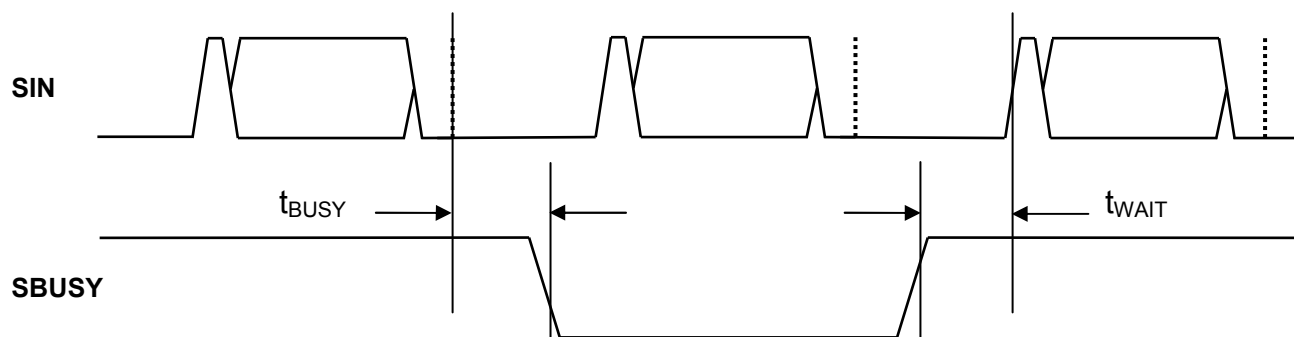

### 3.6.3.2 CMOS LEVEL SERIAL INTERFACE OPERATION

The timing of the CMOS level asynchronous serial interface operation is exactly the same as that of the RS-232 level serial interface timing except the signal levels and polarity are not at RS-232 levels. All timing is specified using 20% and 80% of  $V_{CC}$  as the respective low and high logic levels.

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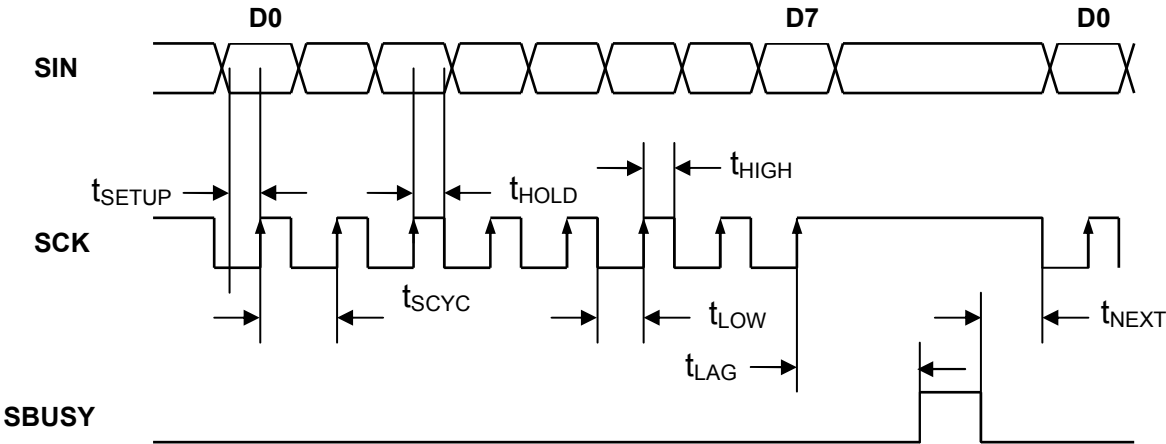

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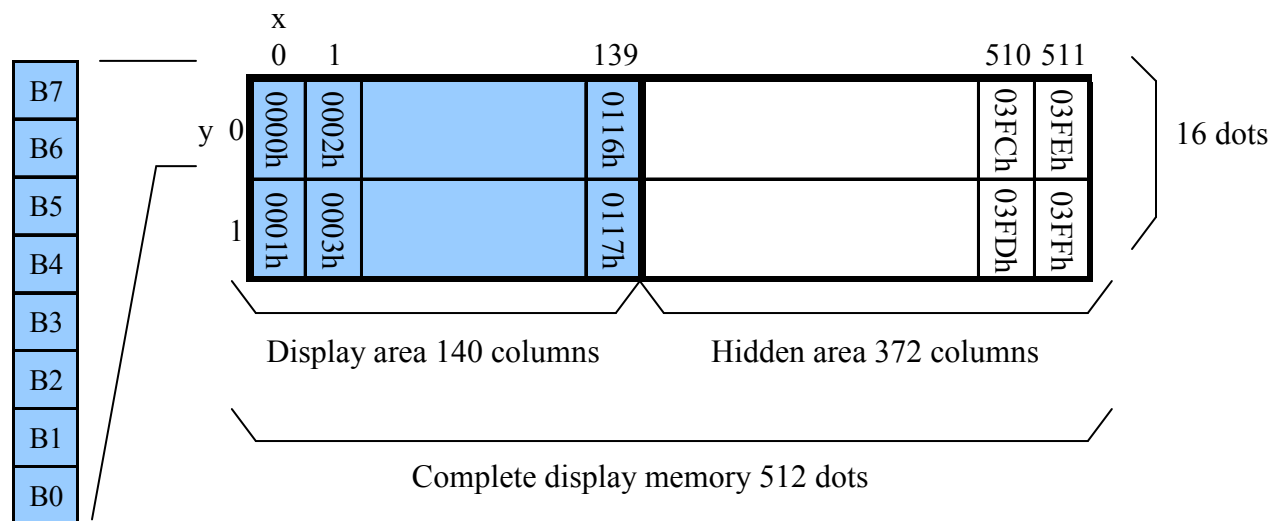
## 4.0 DISPLAY SPECIFICATION

The NAGP1235AB module can display either graphics in a 140 column by 16 row dots format or 5 x 7 dots character fonts.

- Character mode: 5x7 dots
- Character font types: 5x7dots-character, ANK, international font
- Character display width: fixed character 1 & 2, proportional character format 1 & 2
- Attributes: Character magnify and reverse

## 4.1 DISPLAY MEMORY ORGANIZATION

- Size : 512x16 dots total
- Display area: 140x16 dots
- Hidden area: 372x16 dots. The hidden area can be displayed by using commands from the Display Action Command Group
- With the User Window function, the display area can be divided and each window can be controlled independently.



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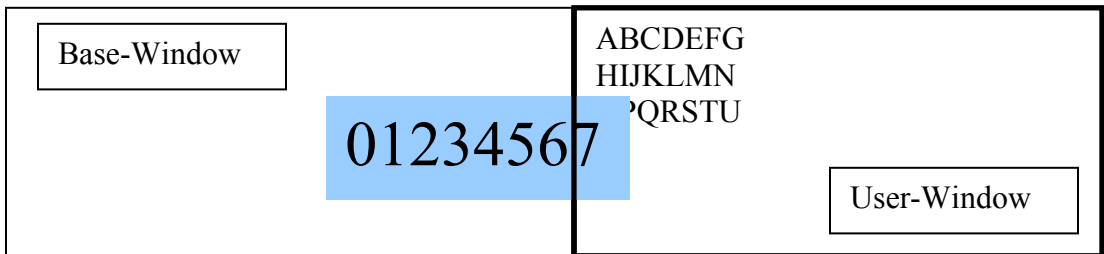
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# 4.2 WINDOWS

The window functions divide the display area into individual windows; the Base-Window and User-Windows. Each window can be controlled and displayed independently. Refer to the Window Command Group. There is no independent display memory for each window.

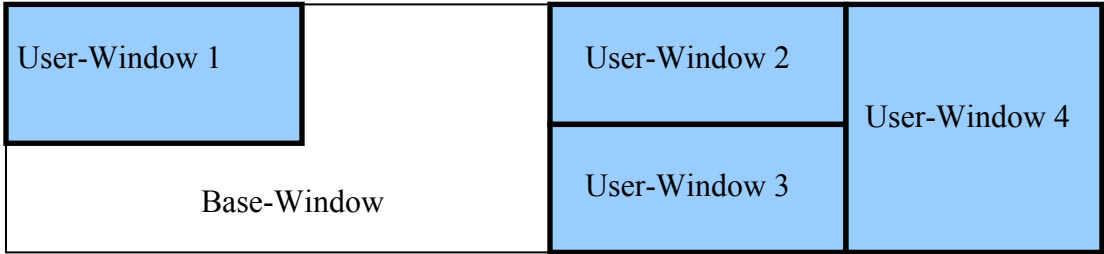
## 4.2.1 BASE-WINDOW

The Base-Window comprises the entire display area. If a User-Window is not defined, all display operations are processed within the Base-Window. When the Base-Window is selected, even if a User-Window is defined, all of the display operation is processed as the Base-Window. The current display pattern of the User-Window may be overwritten if its size exceeds the Base Window area.



## 4.2.2 USER-WINDOW

A User-Window is defined and selected by commands.



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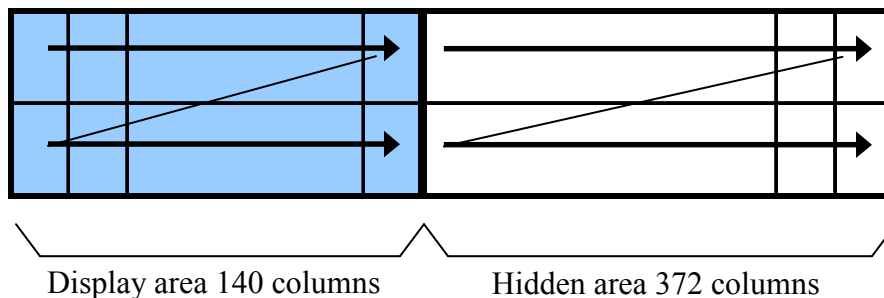
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### 4.3 BASE-WINDOW WRITE SCREEN MODES

There are two types of screen writing modes; Display Screen Mode and All Screen Mode that can be selected by command. (Refer to Window Command Group, “Write Screen Mode Select”).

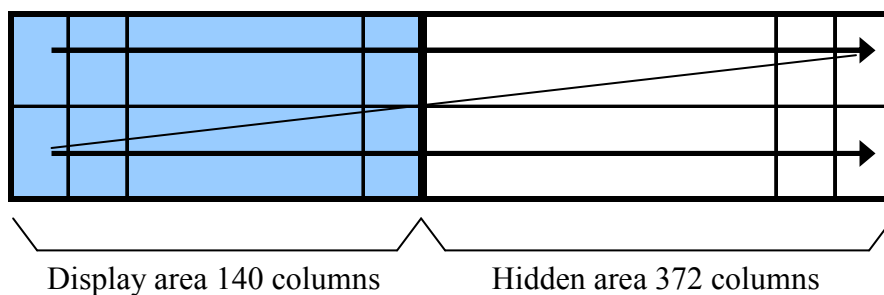
#### 4.3.1 DISPLAY SCREEN MODE (SCANNING)

When the cursor is located in the display area, all operations will be performed within the display area. When the cursor is located in the hidden area, all operations will be performed within the hidden area.



#### 4.3.2 ALL SCREEN MODE (SCANNING)

All operations are performed on the entire continuous display memory.
